NOTICE OF DRAFT PERMIT: Pursuant to Title V of the federal Clean Air Act and Chapter 173-401 of the Washington Administrative Code, a Draft Air Operating Permit (Draft AOP) for Westport Shipyard Inc. (Westport) has been issued for public review. The Draft AOP reflects changes to Westport's original AOP that was reopened for cause under the provisions of WAC 173-401-730 in order to incorporate the requirements of 40 CFR Part 63 Subpart VVVV (also known as the Boat MACT). Westport Shipyard manufactures yachts and other large marine vessels using fiberglass reinforced plastics. The facility is required to comply with 40 CFR Part 63 Subpart VVVV because it is a major source of Hazardous Air Pollutants (HAPs) and because it manufactures fiberglass, recreational boats. The Draft AOP for Westport Shipyard contains enforceable conditions that will assure compliance with applicable air pollution control requirements found in 40 CFR Part 63 Subpart VVVV.

AVAILABILITY: Copies of the following documents are on file and available for review at the Westport Timberland Library and at ORCAA's office: Westport Shipyard's revision application; Draft AOP; and, the associated Technical Support Document (TSD). Copies of the documents (except for the applications) are also available at www.orcaa.org/AOP.

PUBLIC COMMENTS: Comments on Westport Shipyard's Draft AOP may be submitted in writing to Gordon Lance at the above address for ORCAA or by email at gordon@orcaa.org. Comments will be accepted up to close of business on December 10, 2004. Comments on the Draft AOP should pertain to adequacy of the permit in assuring compliance with applicable air quality regulations and standards found in 40 CFR Part 63 Subpart VVVV. Any concerned party may request a public hearing within the specified public comment period. The request should include information to justify the need for a public hearing. If there is significant public interest, ORCAA will hold a public hearing.
